

September feels like a season of turning—toward routines, toward community, toward the gentle structure of fall. Even though the calendar says we still have a little summer left, this is the time of year when many of us reorient. Back to school, back to schedules, back to rhythms that carry us through the changing seasons. In the life of the church, September is also a time of re-engagement. After the slower pace of summer, we begin to look around and ask: Where do I feel drawn this

season? What might God be inviting me to learn, or to offer, or to try? This Sunday, we're making space to ask those questions together through our Ministry Fair, a celebration of the many ways St. John's comes alive through your gifts, your presence, and your participation.


The Ministry Fair offers a chance to see how St. John's puts faith into action, within our walls and out in the world. After both services this Sunday, September 14, the parish hall will be filled with displays and conversations that highlight the work of our many ministries. You'll find opportunities to learn, ask questions, and discover where you might feel called to join in. Whether you're hoping to get more involved or simply curious about what goes on behind the scenes, the fair is a welcoming space to explore. No pressure, just an open invitation to see what's possible—and maybe to glimpse something new about how we serve God together.

Ministry isn't just a church word for "volunteering." It's how we embody the love of God in community. It's how we live out our baptismal promises, offering who we are—our gifts, our time, our presence—for the good of others. Some ministries are public and visible; others are quiet and behind-the-scenes. But all of them matter.

Scripture reminds us that we are members of one body, and the body needs all its parts, not just the flashy ones. When we step into ministry, we're not just helping out. We're participating in something holy: the ongoing work of love, healing, beauty, justice, and welcome. God doesn't ask for perfection; God asks for joyful participation. When we say yes, even in small ways, we step more fully into a life of connection, both with the divine and with those around us.

There's no single way to say yes to ministry. Some people find a clear fit and dive in. Others take time to explore and see what feels right in this season of life. The Ministry Fair is a space for all of that. You might ask a question, strike up a conversation, or jot down your name to learn more. You might try a one-time event or step into a regular role. However you choose to engage, your presence matters. St. John's is shaped by the people who show up—not just to worship, but to serve, to wonder, and to help build something meaningful.

Whether or not you make it to the Ministry Fair on September 14, this season is a wonderful time to ask: Where am I being called? How might I offer what I have—my time, my energy, my presence—for the good of others? Ministry at St. John's doesn't begin and end with a single event. It's woven into the fabric of our life



together, and there's always room to step in. Sometimes that means joining a formal ministry. Other times, it looks like offering encouragement, showing up for someone in need, or tending the unseen spaces of community. However you feel drawn this fall, know that your gifts matter. You are part of what makes St. John's whole. And we are grateful to walk this journey of faith with you.

Sept 11 – Introduction to the Gospel of Luke with Luke Timothy Johnson


Sept 18 – Chapter 1, Adam Hamilton – *Lifting Up the Lowly*

Library News

Books on the Feature Shelves this month are by what I call "Favorite Authors", a group of prolific, contemporary authors, both male and female, who tend to write with a fairly light touch while still getting their point across. If you haven't met them yet, I encourage you to try them this month.


Who doesn't love John Ortberg, especially with all the crazy titles he uses for his books? If You Want to Walk on Water, You Need to Get Out of the Boat, When the Game Is Over, It All Goes Back in the Box, and All the Places to Go. He's friendly, caring, and yet clearly makes his points. Then there's Ann Lamott: Traveling Mercies, Plan B, and Grace (Eventually), plus some newer books; some out of the ordinary observations of Life and our realization of God's place in and with us.



Barbara Brown Taylor is an Episcopal priest who has had a variety of experiences and has written about them as she experienced them. *Leaving Church* and *An Altar in the World* follow her experiences as she leaves serving a small church in Georgia and shows how she finds God in her daily life after that. *Holy Envy* talks about her teaching about major religions of the world and what she and her students took away from learning about other faiths. *Learning to Walk in the Dark* and *Always a Guest* are some of her other books. Rachel Held Evans, on the other hand, describes finding a church where she is comfortable in *Reaching for Sunday* and *Wholehearted Faith*. *A Year of Biblical Womanhood* is her story of trying to live like a woman as described in the Bible (both Old and New Testament), and it is quite a romp; lots of fun. *Inspired* is her discussion of how to read – and question – the Bible.

Other favorite authors include Philip Yancey and Adam Hamilton. I've also included a couple of novels that I think offer insights and questions. Enjoy looking at our "favorite authors" this month and perhaps add one or more to your list of favorite authors.





BCP Spotlight

Saint Michael and All Angels – September 29

Everlasting God, you have ordained and constituted in a wonderful order the ministries of angels and mortals: Mercifully grant that, as your holy angels always serve and worship you in heaven, so by your appointment they may help and defend us here on earth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. (BCP, p. 244)

The Episcopal Church designates specific days to honor significant events, doctrines, or holy people important in the life of the Church. September 29 is dedicated to Saint Michael and All Angels and is a major feast (festival) day in the church year. White is the liturgical color symbolizing joy, purity, and truth.

The collects (prayers) for Holy Days can be found on pgs. 237-246 of the BCP. While some Holy Days commemorate key New Testament events (The Annunciation, The Transfiguration, etc.), most Holy Days commemorate disciples or other key mortals from the New Testament (Mary, Mary Magdalene,

etc.). But Saint Michael is different – he is the Archangel, the leader of the angels in victory over the dragon (identified with Satan). Michael is often portrayed with a sword fighting or standing over a dragon. Observance of a day in honor of Michael dates from the fifth century and was expanded in 1549 to include all angels. (1)

The collect (above) for Saint Michael and All Angels "emphasizes beautifully the scriptural ideas concerning the ministry of angels: their service and worship of God in heaven and their help and protection of those on earth." (2)

So, this September perhaps we reflect on and give thanks for the "Angels and Archangels and all the company of heaven" with whom we join our voices in worship and who also continue to help and defend us here on earth.

Church History in Three Minutes (or Less)

For centuries, the Latin (Vulgate) Bible was the only version available in Western Europe. Until the late 1300s, French was the language of educated and upperclass people in England; English was the peasants' tongue. In 1381, England had a major peasant revolt, which caused authorities to be paranoid about anything that could undermine them—such as people reading the Bible for themselves. In 1404, the Archbishop of Canterbury banned translating any part of it into English. (Fearing peasant Bible-readers was not unjustified. In 1525, armed German peasants used the German Bible to justify their revolutionary demands.) By the mid-1400s, however, using English was a patriotic thing to do, had spread beyond the lower classes, and provoked less anxiety.



After the English Reformation began, dumping the Vulgate for an English Bible was inevitable. The Dutch scholar Erasmus had exposed numerous errors in the Vulgate, and academic study of Hebrew and Greek made consulting earlier texts possible. Henry VIII rejected Latin because of its association with Rome. Already in 1526, an English New Testament prepared by William Tyndale had been printed in Germany and smuggled to England. It contained some translations that church authorities found threatening, so they tried to

suppress it. For example, the Greek *prebyteros* was translated "elder" not "priest" and *ekklesia* was "congregation" not "church." Tyndale's translation has significantly affected English usage: he coined such now-common phrases as "the powers that be" and "my brother's keeper," as well as the words Jehovah, Passover, scapegoat, and atonement.

In 1535, Miles Coverdale cobbled together the first complete English Bible but the translation was terrible and had the misfortune to be endorsed by Queen Anne Boleyn shortly before her fall from grace and execution. "Matthew's Bible" (1537), a hybrid of Tyndale's and Coverdale's translations, might have been officially approved except for printed marginal notes (a common 16th century way to explain difficult texts) too radically Protestant for the king's taste. Instead, Coverdale was assigned to revise "Matthew's Bible," resulting in "The Great Bible" (1539). It was approved by Henry, who had himself shown on the cover page giving the English Bible to his people. Ironically, he is handing out Bibles with a Latin title: *Verbum Dei* (the Word of God)! Next month, I will explain how we got from that translation to the "King James Bible" (1612).
