For me one of the most compelling facets of our Christian faith is the mystery of the Incarnation. God takes on flesh and comes among us, not as an arcane idea or a distant force, but as a person who breathed and cried and needed to be held. The



Incarnation tells us that life with God is lived in bodies and communities, with all the beauty and strain and vulnerability that come with being human. I find myself pausing often this season to remember that God chose this way of coming near.

When I sit with that mystery, I am reminded that God's presence usually becomes clear through the texture of daily life. The holiness of this season does not depend on our ability to make everything serene. It depends on God's willingness to meet us exactly where we are. Incarnation means that God works through our limits and our longings, through our relationships and responsibilities, through moments that feel ordinary as well as moments that take our breath away.

Because God meets us in embodied life, our own varied experiences shape the ways we serve and love. In addition to being rector of St. John's I am a spouse, a parent, a child, a sibling, and a friend. I also have professional roles that reach beyond our walls, like my recent appointment as dean of our mission region in the new diocesan structure (you may have noticed the addition of a "very" to my honorific—"the Very Reverend Alissa" doesn't mean I've suddenly become more holy; it's a designation of this temporary diocesan role). These many facets of embodied life and ministry are not in competition for my time and attention, even if some days it feels like it. In truth, they help me pay attention to time and presence in deeper ways. They teach me to listen with compassion, to honor the gifts and limits of others, and to trust that God works through the full complexity of our lives.

This incarnational truth is also part of our parish life. Ministry grows from the real people who gather, pray, serve, and learn together. It grows from the time we choose to give and the gifts we choose to share. Every committee meeting, choir rehearsal, pastoral visit, and outreach project is part of the way God takes on flesh again among us. Our connection to and work with the diocese expands this ministry as well, as we're able to collaborate with and learn from others with varied experiences and perspectives.

Embodied ministry is holy because it reminds us that God does not work apart from human life. God works through hands that prepare a meal or hold another hand in grief. God works through voices raised in song and in prayer. God works through the choices we make about how to use our time and energy. All these actions become part of the way Christ's presence continues in the world.

As we prepare to welcome Christ again this year, I hope we notice the nearness of God in our shared life. May this season give us courage to honor our own embodied experiences and to trust that God is already moving within them. May we continue to offer our gifts to the life of this parish and the wider church. And may the love that comes to us in Jesus guide us toward deeper connection with one another and with the world God longs to heal.





Scouting for Food



Women Journeying Together





Library News

This month books on the Feature Shelves are devoted to celebrating the Advent/Christmas seasons. All of the "old favorites" are there: devotionals – Watch for the Light, Readings for Advent and Christmas from the Bruderhof Foundation, Let Every Heart Prepare by Barbara Cawthorne Crafton, or Love Came Down by Christipher Webber; history – The Origins of Christmas by Joseph Kelly, or The First Christmas from Borg and Crossan; activities for the season – The Jesse Tree or Tree of Hope; art and music – Rembrandt's The Christmas Story, and Kneeling in Bethlehem by Ann Weems; and many other books to enjoy. These will be found on the first set of shelves, those closest to the hallway.

On the next set of shelves are a variety of NEW Books. Several are books of history, donated by Eric Carlson (see his column for a discussion of these); included are *Paul*, a *Biography* by N.T. Wright, and texts of the prayer books of 1549, 1559, and 1662; this is kind of fun to just page through and see how it relates to our prayer book today. Also among the new books is a large print copy of Adam Hamilton's wonderful book on *The Lord's Prayer*. Shannon Breem presents *The Women of the Bible Speak*, a discussion of 18-20 women in the Bible and what their part was; this includes both a book to read and a workbook to dig deeper into her ideas. Also, you will find *Season 5 of The Chosen* DVD there.






Finally, on a table in front of the windows, you will find pamphlets for the Advent/Christmas seasons. There are devotionals, information, and prayers, as well as calendars. Pamphlets are available for families, for teens and young adults, for seniors, and for all. The calendars are designed to be used from December 1-24, and are short, enjoyable activities to be considered during Advent.

Advent can be a crazy, busy period; find a book, pamphlet, or other and plan to make a few minutes of quiet and peace in each day. May you have a blessed Advent and a very joyous Christmas!

BCP Spotlight

The people standing... The people sit... The people stand or kneel

I didn't grow up in the Episcopal Church – we were Presbyterian. Our services were practical, plain and simple, a reflection of the Iowa farming community. When, as a young adult, I began attending the Episcopal Church I had a lot of trouble getting used to the "showiness" of the service –the vestments, the fancy altar vessels, and even the

formality of the liturgy. I also struggled with when to sit, stand, kneel, etc. And yet there was something that kept drawing me back (besides my boyfriend who later became my husband!)...and here I am nearly 50 years later. I have since figured out generally when to sit, stand or kneel (I follow the rubrics!), I am still unsure of how and when some Episcopalians engage their body during the liturgy in other ways – be that bowing, genuflecting, making the sign of the cross, etc. When is that done and why? Is it "for show" or is there more to it?

While I find some actions distracting and awkward at first, I am learning that with time, they can begin to feel more natural and can enhance worship as my body's physical posture aligns with my heart's intention. Below are some other potential benefits of incorporating movement into our worship...

- Worship becomes more participatory and engaging. Movement can improve focus and reduce distractions as we stay alert and engaged in the service.
- There can be a spiritual significance to postures. Both standing and kneeling are signs of reverence. For example, we stand when we sing praises not only does this allow us to sing more fully but it is a posture of respect and honor.
- Knowing why we do things and acting intentionally vs. out of habit or obligation makes worship more meaningful

Since we are entering the time when we celebrate God among us in the flesh, I thought it was time to explore how I might more fully engage my body in worship and see if it's helpful. Something to keep in mind about all this is that classic Anglican adage "all may, none must, some should", though it's arguable if any "should". Over the next couple of months, the focus of the BCP Spotlight will be postures and actions that may be helpful as we look to engage more fully in our worship experience. If you have questions you'd like to see addressed or comments about how movement enhances your worship, I'd love to hear from you.








Church History in Three Minutes (or Less)

Our library's church history holdings are growing! Several new books are available in Williams Hall until mid-February. After that, they will be in the Waring Room in the "Classical Interest" section. This month's article is on four new books on English church history. In 2026, I will cover the other new titles.



Nicholas Orme's *Going to Church in Medieval England* (Yale University Press, 2021) is a richly-illustrated volume that describes pre-Reformation Christian life in England. Orme

explains the origins of the parish system, its buildings, and the people who served it. Most of the book is about what Christianity involved in practice for the laity. Orme explains their worship and prayer, the sermons they heard, the sacraments which they received, the processions they witnessed and joined, and so on. He looks at the seasons of the church year and special life cycle events connected to the church. It's not a short book but it's organized to make it easy to pursue individual topics of interest, and it is written for non-specialists.

We also now have *Heretics and Believers: A History of the English Reformation* (Yale University Press, 2017) by Peter Marshall. This is the best overview of the topic, and it won the prestigious Wolfson Prize, an annual <u>literary award</u> which recognizes excellence in history writing for the general public. Marshall places the Reformation in the context of early attempts to reform the church, and covers the various developments through the 1580s that shaped Anglicanism as we know it today. While there is attention to political and theological issues, this book stand out for the attention paid to how lay people participated in, resisted, and were affected by religious change. If you are curious about the English origins of the Episcopal Church, this is the place to start.

Finally, two books on our Prayer Book. The first is *The Book of Common Prayer: A Very Short Introduction*, by Brian Cummings (Oxford University Press, 2018). In just over 100 pages, Cummings sets out the origins of *BCP*, how it changed worship and prayer from pre-Reformation practice, and how the *BCP* spread around the globe as Britain's Empire developed. Finally, we now also have a handy one-volume compendium of the actual texts of the 1549, 1559, and 1662 versions of the *BCP* (with an introduction also by Cummings).




